### Shoe Drive Fundraiser

The Butterfly Ball was to be a celebration of our 15-year anniversary and to support the development of five townhomes, which will be known as Sage II at Monarch View. With that in mind, Mrs. Shard'a Sykes and staff have launched a new and exciting fundraiser. The Family Recovery Program, Inc. has partnered with Funds2Orgs to help raise general operating funds through donations of new or gently used shoes. Not only will your shoe donations make a difference in someone's life, but FRP employees can win a \$100 gift card for donating the most shoes.

We need over 2,500 pairs of shoes by the July 31, 2020 to reach our goal. Donating is simple. Just bring your new or gently used shoes to the Sage Center at 1209 N. Rose Street. You won't have to come in the building. There is a drop-box outside of the building.

### Progress with Sage II at Monarch View

In an effort to further the mission of creating family self-reliance, The Family Recovery Program, Inc. purchased five townhomes on N. Milton Avenue, directly across from the Harry and Jeannette Weinberg Building at Sage Center. With Sage II at Monarch View, families will be able to transition from Sage into long-term transitional housing. The work has begun and progress is being made in the expansion of FRP.

Executive Director, Dr. Jocelyn Gainers, has met with Maryland State Senator Cory McCray of the 45th district representing northeast Baltimore, and he has expressed interest in working toward making Sage II a reality. He would like to support the program and get involved in more events like FRP's quarterly graduations and upcoming fundraising events like the Virtual 1-Miler.
