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FRP Graduations

The Family Recovery Program (FRP) is a 9–24-month program where our parents have had their children removed or are in jeopardy of removal by the Baltimore City Department of Social Services (BCDSS) due to substance use. Once referred to FRP, our parents work diligently toward the reunification process. Referrals are made to attend substance use and mental health treatment, they are required to provide numerous random urinalyses, meet with FRP case managers on a weekly basis, and attend court hearings to discuss their progress.

Every quarter, we celebrate those who have persevered and completed the program with our FRP Graduation Ceremony. It is an opportunity to honor our parents' hard work with lots of cheers,

tears, and food. We also congratulate the families and friends who helped them get to this moment.

Reunification Heroes

The American Bar Association Center on Children and the Law ensures those who work on children's law matters throughout the country have the resources and the support they need to do their jobs at the highest level.



It started in 1978 as a legal resource center for attorneys handling child protection cases. It has grown to a full-service technical assistance, training, and systems reform organization.

In June, in honor of National Reunification Month, Adrienne Elliott, legal intern and student at the Georgetown University Law Center, interviewed the Family Recovery Program's President and CEO, Dr. Jocelyn Gainers. She was selected as a reunification hero. Topics ranged from FRP's history to her professional and personal background and history in child welfare.

Dr. Gainers recalls situations from 2006 where FRP was able to assist a young father and his son and found herself at that young boy's high school graduation years later. She also identifies the strengths and weaknesses of the child welfare system in our area and what she sees as possible solutions to the issues we are up against.

Dr. Jocelyn Gainers is the President and CEO of The Family Recovery Program, Inc., in Baltimore, Maryland. With over 30 years of experience, her work centers around providing services to prevent family separation and to reunify families who have lost custody due to substance abuse.

Launched in 2005, the Family Recovery Program has impacted the lives of over 2000 families through offering housing, case management services, and by connecting participants with other organizations in the city that can support their needs. The nonprofit has transformed townhouses and an old school into modern apartments that house families while parents return to school, seek new jobs, and strengthen their families.

BCDSS Appreciation Luncheon

The Family Recovery Program partners with several agencies in its mission to reunify families affected by substance use and the neglect that inevitably comes with it. The road begins with the Baltimore City Department of Social Services (BCDSS) in one of two ways. First, through the filing of a shelter petition with the juvenile court once a child is removed from the home. The second is a phone call or email to FRP requesting a parent enroll in our Horizon Program as a preventative measure for parents who have substance use issues that have come to the attention of BCDSS, but the issues are not quite at the level where removal of the child is warranted. Helping to prevent the removal of the child in the first place is the goal.






